The Canadian wildfires were a pivotal moment for our community and Sustain Dane had a program in place addressing the issue. The Bilingual Leadership program arranged for a team of eight bilingual leaders to attend workshop sessions and install seven air quality monitors. This program was a highlight of 2023 for me. It embodied our mission and values by expanding environmental education, implementing projects, fostering inclusive leadership, and working in partnership with our community. The participants now confidently lead conversations about air quality and are a resource for their friends, neighbors, and colleagues.

In addition to the Sustainable Breakfast Series and Bilingual Leaders program, your support in 2023 also enabled us to:

 Reach 25,000+ people through ripple effect impacts, specifically engaging

with 1,600+ people through our educational programing.

- Collect 18,000+ pounds of food scraps at the South Madison and Eastside farmer's markets to regenerate soil at the Neighborhood Food Solutions farm in Fitchburg.
- Reduce energy bills for 64 units of affordable apartments, as well as improving energy efficiency, comfort, health and resilience in Madison and Middleton.
- Lead over 4,500 students in lunchtime recycling and waste audits at 11 schools
- Launch the Powerful Teen Leaders summer youth employment program for seven Northside teens focused on green economy careers, job readiness, and leadership.


Accelerate Sustainability Workshop

Sustainable Breakfast Series

The Sustainable Breakfast Series highlights current sustainability topics through expert speakers and skill-building opportunities. Breakfast meetings are attended by regional business leaders and individuals who care about integrating environmental, social, and economic sustainability into their professional and personal actions.

PFAS Community Impacts & Management

For our February Sustainable Breakfast Series, we featured a conversation on PFAS, or Per and Polyfluoroalkyl Substances, and their impact. The panelists covered where PFAS come from, their impact on our environment and health, the ways our community is working to reduce their prevalence, and how you can get involved.

Participants gained an understanding of the history of different chemicals used and removed from daily use, heard about actions the local government and other agencies are taking to address the known pollution sources, along with learning what actions they could take to reduce their contact with PFAS.

Electric Vehicles & Madison's Fleet

Our April Sustainable Breakfast Series focused on electric vehicles and the City of Madison's fleet.

The program featured a presentation by Mahanth Joishy with the City of Madison. The City of Madison fleet is a leader in the field. It houses the largest EV fleet and fleet EV charging station network in Wisconsin and well beyond, and the first-ever EV fire truck to be placed into service in all North America.

Mahanth leads the City of Madison Fleet's innovative programs to purchase biodiesel, electric vehicles, hybrid police cars, anti-idling technology, soybean tires, telematics, and more. Participants also got their electric vehicle questions answered.

The Role of Pollinators in Our Ecosystem

At our July Sustainable Breakfast Series, we discussed pollinators' role in our ecosystem and their conservation in a human-dominated world.

Pollination is incredibly important to world food production. One of three bites of food we eat is from insect-pollinated foods. Globally, \$188 billion per year of agricultural production comes from insect-pollinated crops. That's 10 percent of the value of crops used for human food.

Bee and pollinator declines are headline news, prompting questions among scientists, farmers, policy-makers and the public at large about what is causing these declines, what it means for us, and what we can do about it. Dr. Gratton talked about the state of the science and ways to move forward in conserving pollinators in our landscapes, including what we can do in our own backyards.

School Cafeteria Recycling, Composting, & Food Waste Audits

This past year, we continued our work within the Madison Metropolitan School District by expanding a mealtime recycling program and beginning a food waste program. We currently have seven elementary and three middle schools carton recycling.

This year, we wrapped up our Food Waste Warriors grant by completing 34 waste audits at nine schools. Through participation in a research study on food waste inventions, we continue to work with three schools to conduct lunchtime waste audits to reduce food waste. We are also composting at four elementary schools with over 7,000 pounds composted.



Restaurant Sustainability Network

Sustain Dane's Restaurant Sustainability
Network aims to bring awareness and action
to food waste in local restaurants. The
participating restaurants work with us to
identify how and when food waste is created
and set goals to reduce, repurpose, and divert
wasted food. We are also compiling the food
waste reduction practices they already employ
into a best practices reference document for
local restaurants. New this year, one
participant, Coopers Tavern, completed a
composting trial for the back-of-house food
waste at their restaurant.

Other participating restaurants include: Short Stack Eatery, Ian's Pizza, The Mason Lounge, Michaelangelo's Coffeehouse, Madison Children's Museum Little John's Lunchbox Cafe, Attic Angel Community Cafeteria, Food Fight Restaurant Group which includes Everly, The Coopers Tavern, and Miko Poke, and the Dane County Food Collective, which includes Morris Ramen, Heritage Tavern, and Little Johns Kitchens.

Efficiency Navigator

The Efficiency Navigator program, in partnership with Elevate, helps small to medium-sized multifamily housing become more efficient, affordable, and resilient while reducing operating costs for owners and energy cost burden for residents. The program provides complimentary efficiency assessments and step-by-step navigation of implementation for renter-occupied buildings with rents affordable to residents at or below 80% Area Median Income. Upgrades to properties will focus on energy efficiency improvements, and some properties may be a good fit for deeper upgrades including electrification and solar installation.

Program impact since implementations began:

- Total of 262 owners and residents engaged throughout the project
- 159 owners and residents received improvements across 30 buildings
- 117 measures implemented across all buildings including:
 - 92 measures improved energy efficiency such as air sealing; attic, wall, & rim
 joist insulation; heat pump water heater, efficient boiler upgrade, and dual fuel
 air source heat pump.
 - 25 measures decreased environmental toxins such as removal of vermiculite, ventilation in bathrooms and kitchens, removal of gas stoves and installation of electric stoves, improved chimney liner to properly vent combustion gases.
 After air sealing work, combustion safety testing is completed on all properties that have naturally venting natural gas equipment in the property.

This program saves an estimated 67,624 kg CO2e annually, which equates to 295,036 vehicles miles traveled avoided.

Water Steward

Fresh water is Earth's most precious resource. We all use it every day and can all have an impact on the ability to provide reliable supplies of clean water now and for future generations. The program aided participants to become a steward of our local waters. Water Stewards was developed in partnership with Sustain Dane, the Madison Metropolitan Sewerage District, the Madison Area Municipal Storm Water Partnership, the Madison Water Utility, and the Dane County Land and Water Resources Department. We had 122 participants and 100% or the XYZ participants said they were inspired to take action on something they learned at the meeting.

Some of their actions include: water softener replacement at home, installing a rain barrel at home, creating an infographic that outlines easy ways that people can save water when renting/in an apartment setting, a Lunch & Learn for a local office, and outreach in a neighborhood newsletter.

Powerful Teen Leaders

The Powerful Teen Leaders program was led by a coalition of Sustain Dane, Vera Court Neighborhood Center, Warner Park Community Recreation Center (WPCRC), and Northport & Packers Community Learning Center to provide a summer youth employment program for teens in Madison, WI.

The program provided a paid summer employment program focused on serving Northside teens. Participants engaged with a curriculum that includes employment skills, leadership training, community-building activities, S.T.E.M., climate change and sustainability, green jobs, financial literacy, and professional workshops from local businesses. This program aimed to prepare them for employment, particularly in the emerging green economy, and connect them to a network of businesses and support for them to be successful.

EPA Environmental Justice Program

The Latino Academy of Workforce Development (LAWD)'s Bilingual Leadership Academy collaborated with Sustain Dane to expand our Recycle Better program. This version is presented in Spanish and English and is culturally relevant to the Latinx community. In 2023 we had 11 participants.

In addition, these students learned about the importance of air quality and what individuals can do to protect our health from air pollution. A study conducted by the EPA found minority communities, regardless of where they live or how much money they make, are exposed to air pollutants at a much higher rate than white people. Through the program, participants installed Seven PurpleAir air quality monitors.

This program is supported by the Carton Council's Recycling Communication Grant and an EPA Environmental Justice grant.

Farmers' Market Food Scrap Collection

Sustain Dane continued two food scrap drop off sites at the Eastside and South Madison farmers' markets for the 2023 season. In partnership with the City of Madison and Dane County Department of Waste and Renewables, we collected about 18,877 pounds of food scraps over the span of 29 market dates.

Sustain Dane transported the food scraps to a local urban farm operated by the social justice and workforce development nonprofit Neighborhood Food Solutions. There, the food waste was composted and used to grow organic food sold locally. The program was estimated to have involved over 2,000 people and was free for participants.






