Farmers Market Food Scrap Drop-Off Program

We're happy to announce the return of our free [Food Scraps Drop-Off program](#). Over the past two years, this program has composted over 30,000 pounds. Join us this season!

According to the Wisconsin DNR, our landfills consist of 14.5% food that would be traditionally edible, and 6% “food scraps” (like peels). Take action and bring your food scraps to one of our farmers' market drop-off sites:

4/23 Sustainable Breakfast Series: Fashion with a Purpose

Clothing is essential to our lives; it provides an outlet to express yourself, increases self-confidence, and helps meet basic needs. We also acknowledge that fashion requires materials for fabrics, labor to make it, and transportation for shipping. Fashion is responsible for 10% of human-caused greenhouse gas emissions and uses more energy than the aviation and shipping sectors combined. A garbage truck of our discarded clothing is dumped in a landfill or incinerated every second. Our [April Sustainable Breakfast Series](#) on fashion provided solutions to reducing this impact.

We all wear clothes and can dress to impress Mother Nature with some of the following considerations:

- 1. Conscious Buying-** Choose high-quality garments made of lower-impact materials. Consider vintage, clothing swaps, and used options before buying new clothing.
- 2. Maintenance-** Increase clothing longevity by washing less often, on a delicate cycle, and in cool water. Mend clothes when possible and wear until they are worn out.
- 3. Responsible Disposal-** Sell online, gift to friends/family or donate clothes to resale shops. Clothing should not be put into the at-home recycling cart.

Recycle Better Q & A- Plastic Cutlery

Question: This fork is plastic; can I recycle it?

Answer: No, plastic cutlery is not recyclable.

Plastic knives, forks, and spoons are too flat and will get lost during recycling sorting. Check out [this video](#) of the local Pellitteri recycling facility to understand how the sorting takes place. They also have little to no value in the plastics market.

While the best practice is reusable silverware, there are creative ways to find new life for plastic utensils. Upcycle them into [plant ID markers](#) or an art project. If wrapped and unused, donate them to a food pantry.

As spring sets in and grass starts to grow, keep in mind No/Low Mow May! This initiative to not mow in May can help pollinators find substantial food sources as opposed to monoculture grass lawns. Clover, dandelion, creeping Charlie, and violet are common lawn flowing plants. They can provide food for pollinators, especially while other flowers are not yet blooming.


