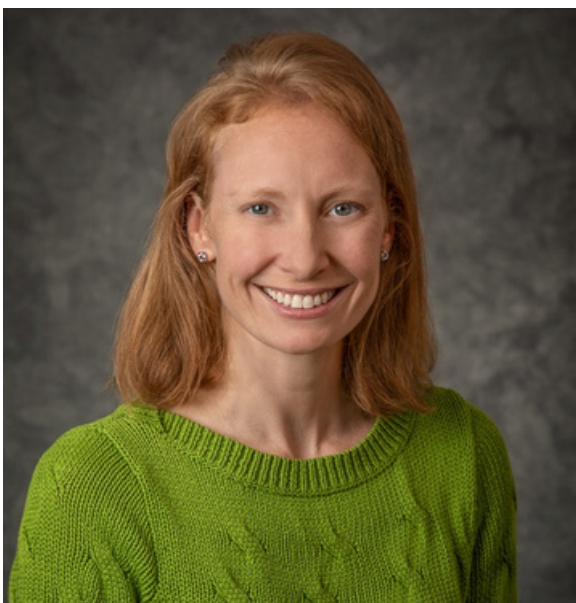

Sustain Dane will remain the vital convener, educator, and implementer of sustainability initiatives in Dane County. Projecting our work over the next 25 years will enable over 200 powerful teen leaders from our summer workforce programs to implement their sustainability knowledge and confidence in jobs within and outside the green economy. It will mean over 3,000 families living in affordable housing where we have implemented energy efficiency measures, will have lower utility bills and more comfortable and healthy homes. Twenty thousand students impacted through school lunch time recycling education will pass on this knowledge to their own kids. Over 1 million pounds of food scraps diverted from the landfill through our food scrap drop-off sites will become valuable compost. As many as 35,000 participants in our events, workshops, and Summits will continue to benefit from knowledge, networking, and motivation.

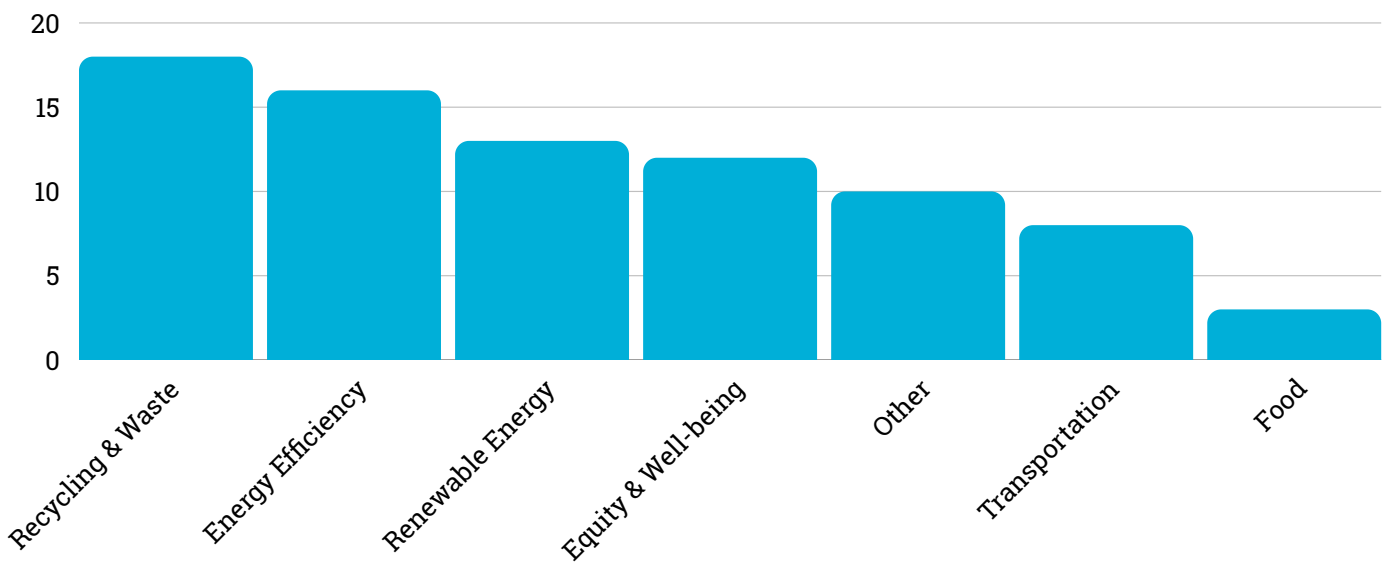
Accelerate Sustainability Workshop

Sustainable Breakfast Series

The Sustainable Breakfast Series highlights current sustainability topics through expert speakers and skill-building opportunities. Breakfast meetings are attended by regional business leaders and individuals who care about integrating environmental, social, and economic sustainability into their professional and personal actions.

Our Leap in Sustainable Transit

For our February Sustainable Breakfast Series, we featured a conversation on sustainable transit in our communities. Mike Rusch from Metro Transit explored the transformative impact of the new bus system and Zia Brucaya from Greater Madison MPO highlighted sustainable transit resources and emerging opportunities. Participants also learned about the launch of the all-electric Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) system, new fare payment, and new bus tracking.

This program uncovered how sustainable transit is shaping a more connected and resilient future for our community. Participants engaged with each other and learned more about the RoundTrip program, which supports individuals and employers in making sustainable transportation choices. Participants reflected and discussed the short trips they take by cars and if any could be switched to using a more sustainable method. They were also asked to make a sustainable transit commitment.

Carbon Sequestration

Our September Sustainable Breakfast Series featured a conversation about carbon sequestration and local projects within Dane County Parks.

What's beneath our feet has the power to reduce climate change. Our conversation on carbon sequestration focused on what it is, how it works, and how we're using it locally to reach climate goals. We heard from Gregg Sanford, UW–Madison professor, who broke down the science of capturing and storing carbon. Additionally, Michelle Probst from Dane County Land & Water Resources shared real-world examples of how our local sequestration projects are making a measurable difference. Participants learned how local land management is playing a role in the County's climate neutrality commitment and how nature-based solutions can be part of a healthier, more resilient future.

The Future of Farming

Sustain Dane gathered community members at Vitruvian Farms in McFarland for a lively farm and food event that shared how we can build a more resilient and inclusive food future. Attendees were introduced to the Dane County Food Action Plan and heard from a panel of local farmers who talked about land access and farm preservation, the regional food system, and sustainable practices and resiliency. Participants had the opportunity to contribute ideas and feedback to help shape a more equitable and sustainable food future. The program concluded with a Vitruvian farm tour and time to connect with fellow attendees.

School Cafeteria Composting & Recycling

This past year, we introduced a composting program at two elementary schools and one high school in the Sun Prairie Area School District. Students were eager to participate in composting and give their food waste a second life. Overall in 2025, we led 800+ students and 20+ faculty in lunch-time composting across three schools with over 5,445 lbs. of food waste diverted.

We continued our waste reduction work with assisting Madison Metropolitan School District in implementing and sustaining milk carton recycling programs in all 32 elementary schools.

Powerful Teen Leaders

Sustain Dane leads the Powerful Teen Leaders program which is a paid summer employment program focused on serving eight Northside teens. Participants engaged with a curriculum that includes employment skills, leadership training, community-building activities, S.T.E.M., climate change and sustainability, green jobs, natural resources, financial literacy, and professional workshops from local businesses. This program aims to prepare them for employment, particularly in the emerging green economy, and connect them to a network of businesses and support for them to be successful.

This year's program included a wide array of information and engaging experiences for our participants including a photovoltaic (solar) lab with Madison College, a Geographic Information Systems (GIS) week with the State Cartographers Office, learning about waste & recycling processes, and more.

Efficiency Navigator

The Efficiency Navigator program, in partnership with Elevate, helps small to medium-sized multifamily housing become more efficient, affordable, and resilient while reducing operating costs and energy cost burden. The program provides complimentary efficiency assessments and step-by-step navigation of implementation for renter-occupied buildings with rents affordable to residents at or below 80% of Area Median Income.

In 2025, 206 residents in Madison, Middleton, and Fitchburg received improved affordable housing through the Efficiency Navigator building improvement measures. The residents living in the apartments included approximately 29 children and 24 senior citizens.

Energy efficiency measures implemented included attic insulation and air sealing, wall insulation, window replacement, rim joist insulation, heat pumps, and more. Efficiency Navigator implemented 78 energy efficiency measures. Through the energy efficiency work at 130 units, the program also identified and addressed 29 health and safety measures. All implementations lead to an approximate annual savings of 82,418kg CO₂ or the equivalent of reducing 203,904 vehicles miles traveled (VMT). The VMT avoided is equivalent to driving around the earth eight times. We also facilitated permanent reductions of chloride (salt) to the district's sewer system in five buildings through optimizations, hot-line conversion, and clunker replacements with support from the Madison Metropolitan Sewerage District.

Farmers' Market Food Scrap Collection

Sustain Dane ran a free food scrap collection program at three sites for the 2025 season: Eastside, South Madison, and Westside Community farmers' markets. Collection for the Eastside and South Madison farmers' market lasted the whole season while the Westside included three additional weeks of collection compared to last year. In partnership with the City of Madison, we collected 40,417 pounds of food scraps, which surpassed our goal of collecting the weight of 20 bison.

Sustain Dane transported the food scraps to a local urban farm operated by the social justice and workforce development nonprofit Neighborhood Food Solutions. There, the food waste was composted into approximately 1,200 linear feet of soil and used to grow organic produce sold locally. The program had over 7,100 drop offs and was free for participants.

Recycle Better

Our award-winning Recycle Better program turned five this year. We developed this program in partnership with the City of Madison. The program gives participants the tools they need to teach their family, neighbors, friends, and coworkers how to improve recycling and community sustainability. Each session has two 90-minute classes which enable participants to become a Recycling Steward.

This program is part of our broader efforts for better recycling in the region. In total, the program has reached over 102,708 people through participant outreach projects. This year, we also held Spanish language versions of this program in partnership with Latino Academy of Workforce Development. This version is presented in Spanish and English and is culturally relevant to the Latino community.

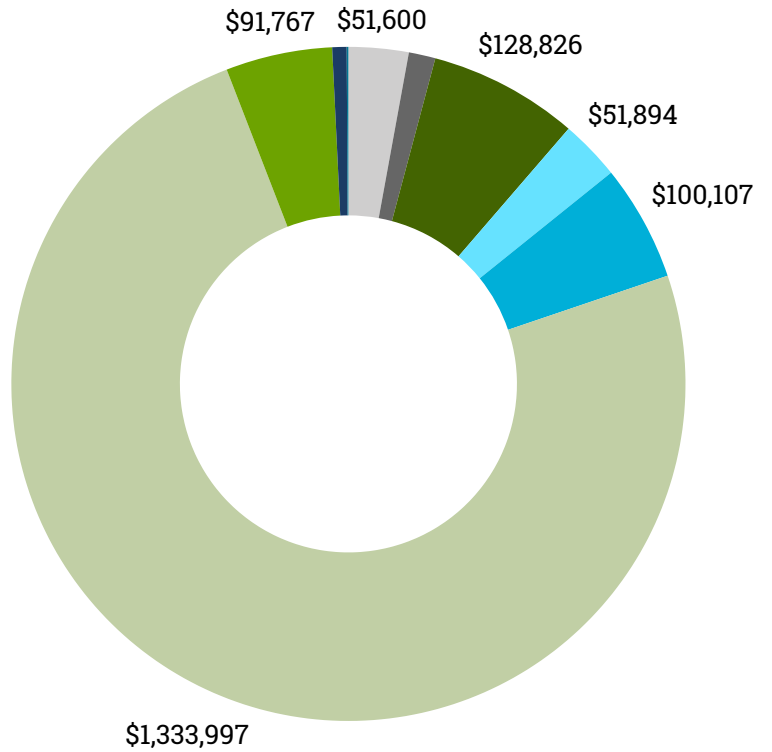

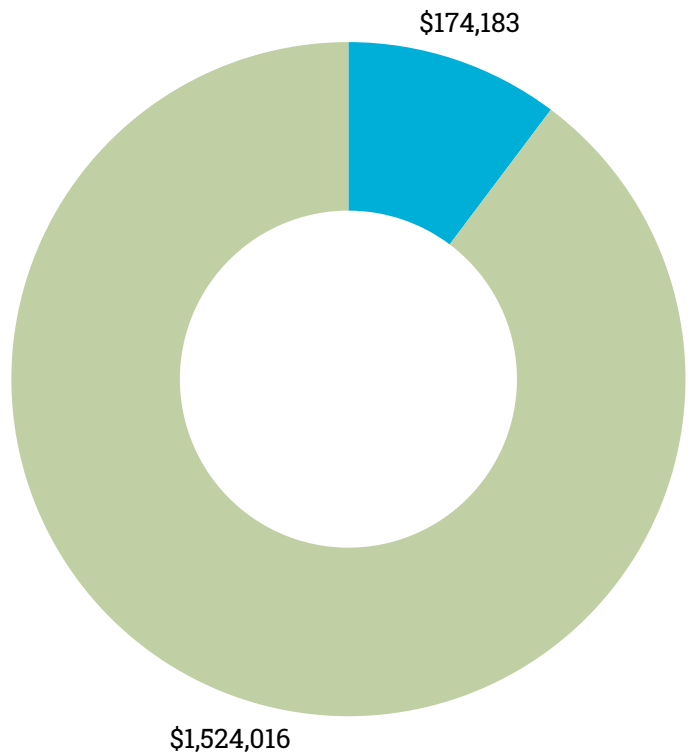
